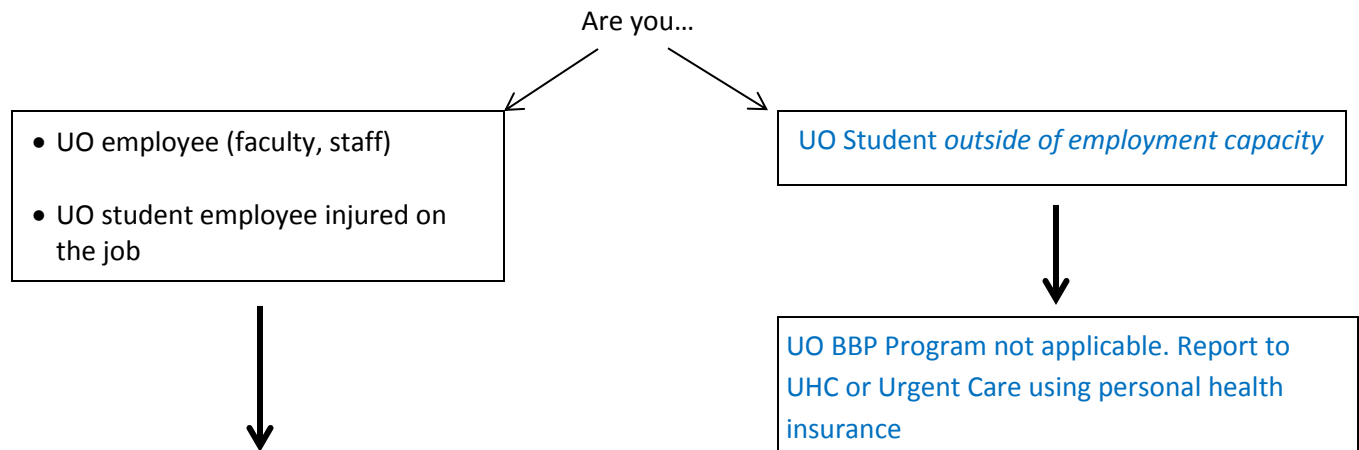


## HAD A POTENTIAL BLOODBORNE PATHOGENS EXPOSURE?



Determine if a bloodborne pathogens exposure has occurred:

An **Exposure Incident** means a specific eye, mouth, other mucous membrane, non-intact skin, or parenteral (skin piercing) contact with someone else's blood or other potentially infectious materials (OPIM) that results from the performance of your work duties.

**"OPIM"** includes the following human body fluids:

- Semen
- Vaginal secretions
- Synovial fluid
- Pleural fluid
- Pericardial fluid
- Peritoneal fluid
- Amniotic fluid
- Saliva *in dental procedures*
- Any body fluid that is visibly contaminated with blood
- All body fluids in situations where it is difficult or impossible to differentiate between body fluids

Note: OPIM does not cover **vomit** or **saliva**. Saliva falls under OPIM only during dental procedures.

If you are not sure, consult with Environmental Health and Safety (EHS) at 541-346-3192. If you are still unclear, handle the incident as an exposure until it is found not to be by medical evaluation.
