


EARTHQUAKE HAZARDS

Crustal earthquakes

- Depth generally <20 km
 - Occur throughout PNW
 - Duration of shaking can be seconds to tens of seconds
 - If large enough, local damage
 - Scott's Mills (M5.2) and Klamath
 Falls (M6.0) earthquakes (1993)




July 4, 2015 Walterville earthquake (M4.2)



Deep earthquakes


- Depth > 40 km
 - Mainly under Puget Sound
 - M7 events in 1949 & 1965, plus 2001 Nisqually event
 - Duration of shaking can be tens of seconds
 - Can be large, local damage can be severe






Subduction zone earthquakes

- Locked portion of fault:
 - M9 event in 1700
 - Lies primarily offshore
 - Extends from N. California to Vancouver Island
 - Duration of shaking can be up 4 to 5 minutes






50-year probabilities

Cascadia M9: 10-20% Southern Cascadia M8-9: 25-40%



Deep M \geq 6.5: 84% –(similar to 1949, 1965, 2001)

Shallow Puget Sound and I-5 corridor $M \ge 6.5$ -Shallow in entire area: 15%





Damage Potential Site response is important

Light: felt by all; windows crack; dishes, glassware, books fall off shelves; pictures fall off walls; furniture moved; weak plaster, adobe building and poorly built masonry cracked.

Moderate: difficult to stand or walk; furniture broken; damage to poorly built masonry buildings; weak chimneys break; plaster, loose bricks, cornices, unbraced parapets and porches fall; some cracks in better masonry buildings:

Moderate/Heavy: steering of cars affected; extensive damage to unreinforced masonry buildings, including partial collapse; fall of some masonry walls; twisting and falling of chimneys and monuments; unseecured wood frame house move on foundation.

Business can only tolerate <u>two to four</u> weeks of disruption of essential services




DROP, COVER, HOLD ON

EQ: WHAT TO DO

- Drop, Cover, Hold until ground stops shaking
- Have a Go Bag and Emergency Kit
- Evacuate the building. Stay out until cleared by building inspector
- Be prepared to be on your own for the first 48-72 hours. Our plan will start then.






IF YOU ARE **PREPARED** FOR THE **ZOMDIE apocatypse**, then you are prepared for any-emergency.

- Extra clothes, tennis shoes







- Deeds, titles, and other ownership records for home, autos, RVs, boats
- Birth certificates / naturalization papers
- Marriage license/divorce papers/child custody papers
- Passports and military papers

- Trust agreements
- Living wills, power of attorney and health care power of attorney
- Certificates of stocks, bonds and other investments
- Insurance policies
- Home improvement records
- Household inventory documentation

INSURANCE

- Not covered by standard homeowners, separate policy
- Deductible typical 10-15% of dwelling value
- Average annual cost in Oregon \$200 \$300 annually
- Can also cover temporary housing costs
